From the Principal's Office by Mary Holtorf, Principal of Schools

I had the pleasure of teaching for Father Parrott in his 9-12th grade religion classes last Thursday. I decided to tackle the issue of bullying in schools. This topic has received a lot of media attention lately with the suicides of the victims of bullying. My objectives for the day were to talk about what bullying is, what role technology plays in cyberbullying, and what Catholic young people can do about it.

I started out the class referencing the Matthew 7:12, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." This powerful quote says it all. Treating others as you want to be treated is an essential skill that must be taught in our schools.

After teaching for the day, I realized that bullies don't always see the problem, that students who have not been bullied do not see the problem, and that it is not a problem that can be swept under the rug by saying, "That never happens here at Pacelli." I think it is important for students to understand that not only does bullying happen in school, it can happen in the workplace, in a relationship, or in a friendship.

We finished up the class by talking about how we can help someone who is being bullied. We talked about how a supportive family and friend group is very important. If a student is being bullied they need to talk about it with a trusted adult. My

door is always open for a student to come in with their concerns.

We take "bullying" very seriously at Pacelli. Students need to be taught how to treat others in a kind and respectful way. Many examples they witness on television or in movies are not kind and respectful. Parents can help by being an example of how to treat others in a kind way (even when you get angry) and being careful about the television shows young people are watching. Together we can help the bullies, the victims and the bystanders know what the "right" response is to bullying.

## How Would You Spend \$190 Million?

The tobacco industry thinks you're worth it. They spend that much every year in Minnesota on marketing their products. They want to get you addicted to their products, especially if you're a young person. Tobacco companies want to increase the number of youth using tobacco because they need new people to replace their other customers who are dying. In Minnesota, more than 5,500 people die every year of tobacco-related diseases.

The tobacco companies are currently introducing new products to make tobacco more enticing.

E-cigarettes look like a regular cigarette but they are battery operated and electronically vaporize an inhaled solution that contains nicotine and other chemicals. They come in varying colors and in candy flavors like apple, cherry and chocolate to be more appealing. At this time, there is no law against them in the US but they have been banned in Canada and Australia.

Other new products are sticks, orbs and strips. These are made of finely milled tobacco. When placed in the mouth, they dissolve and release significant amounts of nicotine. Orbs look like a small mint or TicTac and have packaging that is similar. Strips look like a breath-freshening strip and also have similar packaging. Sticks look like a toothpick. These products all contain tobacco and carry the same risks as tobacco in more traditional forms.

The tobacco companies are willing to pay big bucks to get you addicted. If they hook you, are you willing to pay the price--your health and your life.

# Daily 5

That was then; this is now....

If you walked into a classroom years ago during a literacy block, you may have seen children at their desks working on a worksheet, or an entire class choral reading from the same text despite the varying abilities, or even children working in small groups at what we call "centers." Chances are you would notice a child here or there who was off task, and a teacher who raced over to redirect him/her. Unfortunately, this manner of teaching literacy made it difficult for a teacher to work with a small group of children or even an individual child while at the same time keeping the rest of the class engaged in meaningful literacy tasks. This year at Pacelli Elementary School, we are blessed to have a large portion of time set aside in our daily schedule for quality reading tasks! As a staff, we have decided to use this time to incorporate a reading program called Daily 5.

Daily 5 is a way of structuring our reading block so that every student is independently engaged in *meaningful* literacy tasks. These research-based tasks will have the biggest impact on student reading and writing achievement and they will help to further foster children who love to read and write. Students are given independent practice time to read and write while the teacher provides focused, intense instruction to individuals or small groups of students. Once Daily 5 begins in the classroom, students will be fully engaged on a daily basis with one of the following five tasks:

- *Read to Self*
- *Work on Writing*
- *Read to Someone*
- *Listen to Reading*
- *Word Work.*

Daily 5 takes several weeks of intense focus in order to teach children each aspect and to build stamina so that they can move from one task to the next. Once the children have mastered all five components individually, they are ready to begin Daily 5 in its entirety. After the introduction phase, children choose each day which aspects of Daily 5 they would like to do. During these independent work times, as teachers, we are able to pull small groups of children or individual children so that we can help them focus and target exactly what their reading needs are!

Please feel free to stop in and talk with me more about Daily 5, or take a look at the wall outside of our classroom (Room 105) for more information. We would also be happy to show you how Daily 5 works so you can understand what your child is sharing with you at home.

## Pacelli Senior's Writing Skills Published

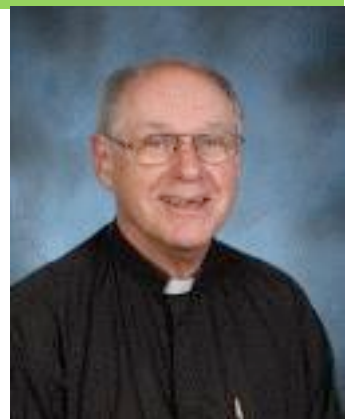

## Pacelli Catholic Schools Meet Our President: Father Tupper

### **Saint of the Month**

According to legend, Cecilia was a young Christian of high rank promised in marriage to a Roman named Valerian. Through her example he was converted, and was martyred along with his brother.

Cecilia refused to sacrifice to the gods. The judge condemned her to be smothered by steam. She was shut in for a night and a day and the fires were heaped up and made to glow and roar their utmost, but Cecilia did not even break out into perspiration through the heat. God protected her. Then the judge ordered a soldier to kill her with the sword. He struck her 3 times, but did not cut off her head. He left her bleeding, and she lived 3 days. Crowds came to her and collected her blood with napkins and sponges while she preached to them or prayed.

After receiving Holy Communion, she died in 117. Cecilia is honored as the patroness of religious music. She sang in her heart and sometimes with her voice. She has become a symbol of the Church's teaching that good music is an important part of the liturgy.

Prayer: Lord, hear our requests. Through the intercession of Cecilia, please grant what we ask. Amen.

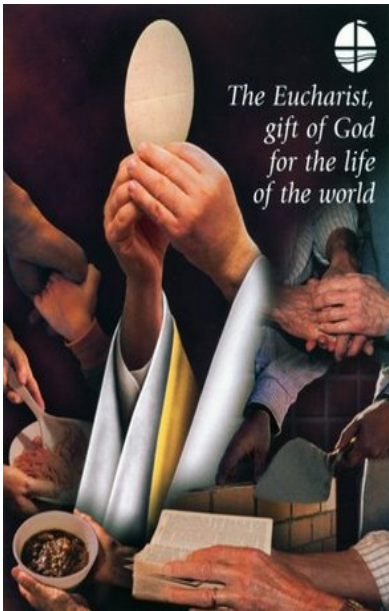

# Catholic Corner

## Do This in Memory of Me

*The following article has been submitted by Deacon Rich Aho. We are excited that our 3 Deacons: Rich, John and Dave have wholeheartedly accepted our invitation to write monthly columns about the different parts of the Mass. In the future, their writings can be found in this newsletter under "Deacon's Dialogue".*

In order to go through the rites of our Mass, we need a short reminder of the history behind it. The Mass was born at the Last Supper, where the Lord took bread and wine and commanded his apostles to "do this in memory of me". It was foretold in the Old

Testament when the priest Melchizedek offered bread and wine to the Lord God.

In the early church, there was some liturgical uniformity in how the Mass was celebrated, but not absolute uniformity. Liturgical books were being used by the middle of the 4th century, and possibly by the end of the 3rd, but the earliest text dates from the 7th century. Musical notation was not used in the western church until the 9th century when the Gregorian chants were codified. Up until then, the only book to be used was the Bible from which the

lessons were read. Psalms and the Lord's Prayer were known by heart, otherwise the prayers were extempore, or at will.

There was little that was done as ceremonial, in the sense that we use the term today. The lessons were read from a convenient place where they could be heard, and bread and wine brought to the altar at the appropriate time. All was done with the greatest reverence and respect and became established customs, in other words liturgical actions were becoming ritualized.


